
Directory preparation is underway. If you have any changes, please submit them now!!



In 1980, Conze formed Royle Associates, Inc. in Darien, which provides real-estate related services, including construction, project management, legal and regulatory entitlement, and property management.


He has been a member of the Daren Planning and Zoning Commission for 19 years, serving as chairman since 2006.

Ronald S. Kahan, M.D. retired from his dermatology practice in March 2012 and is writing a book about functioning in Medicare and the medical care system.




Jim and his wife Carolyn live in Darien where he is an elder of the Presbyterian Church.
