

Meet our new members:

John Watt grew up in Lake Placid, N.Y. where he was born in 1946. He graduated 1964 from the Northfield Mount Hermon School, Mount Hermon, Mass.

Watt received a B.A, degree in Geography from Middlebury College in 1968 and an MBA from Dartmouth in 1976. He served in the U.S. Army for two years after graduating from Middlebury College.

Watt began his business career at Chase Manhattan Bank, New York City, with the utility finance group in 1976 and ten years later joined Security Pacific Bank, Los Angeles, Calif., in the same capacity.



He then went to work for the Fitch Ratings, New York City, in 1992 as a financial analyst and in 1997 joined the Bank of New York in their utility finance group. He retired in 2012. Watt and his wife Penny live in Darien. He is a member of the Middlesex Club and enjoys bicycling, New York Rangers hockey and tennis.

Pete Kenyon was born 1938 in Chicago. He grew up in Old Greenwich and attended Kent School, Kent, Conn., graduating in 1957.

While at Kent, he played football when the coach intro-

duced the single wing formation resulting in an undefeated season in 1955. After injuring his knee playing ice hockey, he went on to serve as a student coach for football, ice hockey, and crew at the league level.

In 1962, he graduated from Columbia University's School of General Studies with a B.S. degree in International Relations. Prior to attending Columbia, he studied at Brown University, where he was on the varsity swim team and



played lacrosse, and attended Mitchell College. Pete served in the U.S. Navy for almost four years aboard a destroyer based in San Diego that deployed in the western Pacific during the Vietnam War. Released from active duty in 1966, he went to work in the reinsurance business at General Reinsurance Corporation and is currently owner of Kenyon Consulting Company. During his working career, he served in the United States Naval Reserve for 18 years and retired as

During the 1980s, he served as Moderator of the Darien Representative Town Meeting for six terms.

John F. Bartlett was born 1942 in San Antonio, Texas, and grew up in St. Louis, Missouri, where he graduated from high school in 1960. He received a BA degree in history from Washington & Lee University in 1967 and an LLB degree in 1967.

Terrie Wood, State Representative for Darien and Rowayton, will speak on the current political climate and the stasis of the Connecticut legislature.

Terrie will begin serving her 2nd term on January 5 and has been appointed by House Republican Leader Lawrence F. Cafero, Jr. to serve on three legislative committees. She will be the Ranking Member (Republican Leader) for the Select Committee on Children in addition to the Appropriations and Environment Committees. Flooding, affordable housing and efficient use of the tax dollars that we send to Hartford are Terrie's biggest concerns. Terrie wants to address the first two with a common sense approach, working with local boards and agencies to understand the specific needs of Rowayton and Darien, then approach the funding sources in Hartford with that sound information. She has an understanding of the issues that matter most to the 141st District as well as real experience in bringing people together to find solutions and make the community stronger.

Ronald S. Kahan will talk on "Medicare Decision Making--Choosing and Using Your Coverage Wisely". While this will be a presentation, it will also have an interactive element. Since virtually every member of the audience will have had some contact with Medicare, questions and comments-both during and after the talk will be encouraged.

Ron practiced dermatology in Norwalk for 34 years and has a long interest in how seniors utilize Medicare. He is presently writing a book on mastering Medicare and today's health care system.

He set up his practice in 1977 at the Dermatology Center in Norwalk and also served on the Norwalk Hospital staff. Ron retired from his practice in March 2012 and joined the SMA in the fall of 2012.

Gordon G. Chang, a lawyer, author, television pundit, and will speak on the current status of the USA relationship with China. Gordon writes primarily on China, Asia, and nuclear proliferation and believes we will see discontinuous change around the world in the near future, so he is not into making long-range personal plans. He is author of two books, "The Coming Collapse of China" and "Nuclear Showdown: North Korea Takes On the World". Gordon is a contributor to Forbes and, on December 9, 2012, published an article in Forbes titled "Move Over, Michigan, China Is The World's Next Rust Belt".

He is a regular contributor to The John Batchelor Show, The Glenn Beck Program on Fox News, and CNN. He also appeared as a special guest on Comedy Central's The Daily Show with Jon Stewart in 2006. In February, 2010, he appeared on Al Jazeera English and argued that China does not have a lot of economic leverage over the US, and it is actually the other way around. In November, 2010, he appeared on Imus in the Morning to discuss the Yeonpyeong bombing.

Harlan Stone, chief business officer of the US Tennis Association (USTA) and Co-Founder and Managing Partner of SJX Partners. Harlan will speak on how the USTA operates and the trends in sports marketing today.

In August, 2008, the USTA named Harlan Stone as its new Chief Marketing Officer for Professional Tennis. In this role, Harlan was responsible for all advertising, marketing, promotional programs and campaigns for the US Open, the Olympus US Open Series, the USTA Pro Circuit and all USA Team events including the Davis and Fed Cups.

In April, 2011, at the end of his contract with the USTA, Harlan re-signed through 2014 with the USTA organization as chief business officer, for which he will still sell corporate sponsorships and television. While Harlan retained an USTA executive title, he jointly launched SJX Partners, a New Canaan, CT-based property representation firm. Among the first clients of SJX Partners were the USTA, along with Cirque du Soleil, the Dew Tour and Alli Sports, which operates the Dew Tour.
