Jack Ford and Blake Berson will talk about Forward Progress: The Integration of SEC Football, a CBS Sports documentary about Nate Northington, the first African-American football player in the Southeastern Conference. The documentary covers the impact of his arrival in 1967 on the University of Kentucky, the SEC, and the sports and cultural landscape in the United States. The one-hour documentary aired during African-American History Month on February 16, 2015. Jack Ford served as executive producer and Blake Berson as producer.

Stew Leonard Jr. will talk about the company's history and business practices that have contributed to its success in the highly competitive food retail industry. Stew Leonard's opened its first dairy store in Norwalk in 1969. Since then it has developed into a non-traditional retailing business model. It is a unique family-owned and operated, farm-fresh grocery store once called "The Disneyland of Dairy Stores" by The New York Times for its in-store entertainment and costumed characters. The company is continuously featured in marketing textbooks and business school case studies. He is listed as one of the top 25 speakers from the Washington Speakers' Bureau.

Terrie Wood, State Representative for Darien and Rowayton, will talk about the current fiscal state of Connecticut. Topics will include the ongoing budget challenges as well as the status of Senate Bill 1, which creates revenue sharing on a regional basis. Frist elected in 2009, Terrie is the ranking member on the Human Services Committee and a member of the Finance and Regulations Review Committees. She was co-chair of the Mental Health Working Group of the Gun Violence and School Security Bill in 2013, and instrumental in crafting and implementing the mental health portion of the bill. She cochaired the MORE Commission Working Group on Special Education 2013 – 14. Terrie is past president of the Darien Land Trust, founder and the first chairman of the Darien Environmental Group, past trustee of the Darien Library and The Community Fund and former member of the Darien Republican Town Committee. She chaired The Barbara Harrington Fund, an educational enrichment fund for teachers in the Darien school system, and was an Advisory Member of Person to Person. A former commercial/ voiceover actor in New York City and portrait photographer, she is a graduate of Rollins College and a 36 year resident of Darien.

Dr. Serena-Lynn Brown will talk about transcranial magnetic stimulation (TMS), a new, effective, safe, noninvasive, non-pharmacological, FDA approved therapy treatment to deal with disorders such as depression, bipolar disorder and anxiety. Since 2013 she has been actively involved in providing TMS as a treatment option for patients with treatment-refractory depression and in communicating to the medical community the great efficacy of TMS. Dr. Brown is an internationally recognized M.D., Ph.D. with more than 20 years of experience as a clinical psychopharmacologist. She has published more than 100 scientific papers and has been continuously selected in various publications as a "Top Doctor" or "Best Doctor". Dr. Brown earned her B.A. from Reed College; her M.S., M. Phil., and Ph.D. from Yale University; and her M.D. from the University of Pittsburgh. She spent nearly a decade as Director of Psychopharmacology in the Department of Psychiatry at the Albert Einstein College of Medicine where she remains on the faculty. Her areas of specialization include the treatment of mood, anxiety, eating, and attention deficit disorders, as well as substance abuse issues.






