David Genovese, real estate developer and founder of Baywater Properties in 2001, will talk about his company’s plan to redevelop downtown Darien. The plan would transform the area of Corbin Drive and Boston Post Road into a new mixed-use development, including luxury housing, retail stores, office space, public parking and a town green for social gatherings. The six-acre parcel is across the street from the Darien Playhouse. The goal is to transform the downtown of Darien into a more pedestrian-friendly place where people can comfortably live, work and play. Collaborating with David on the project is Robert A.M. Stern, Dean of the School of Architecture, Yale University; and Penny Glassmeyer of Baywater Properties. Senator Bob Duff, Connecticut senate majority leader, will discuss the recent legislative session with a focus on the state budget and transportation projects and issues. Re-elected to the senate in 2014, he was chosen by his colleagues in 2015 as majority leader. Evonne Klein, commissioner, Connecticut Department of Housing, will talk about “Affordable Housing in the 21st Century: Myths, Reality and Progress.” Appointed by Governor Dannel P. Malloy in 2013, Ms. Klein is the first commissioner of the then newly created Connecticut Department of Housing. The department provides a wide array of funding programs and services aimed at ending homelessness, increasing the supply of affordable housing and creating new homeownership opportunities. Under her leadership, the department has expanded development of individual and family support programs and dramatically increased the state’s investment in affordable housing. Ms. Klein is a resident of Darien and entered public service as a member of the Darien Board of Selectmen, serving from 2001 to 2009, including three terms as first selectman. During her tenure, she served as vice chair of the South Western Region Metropolitan Planning Organization and as co-vice chair on the Alliance for Sensible Airspace Planning. A graduate of Fairfield University, she received a B.A. degree and a master’s degree in corporate and political communications. She also completed

many common health problems, from heart failure to depression, suffered by United States Presidents that give insight into their characters. He also will focus on some of the interesting and lesser-known facts about these men. Jack is a senior advisor in the Department of Medicine, Stamford Hospital, and a professor of Clinical Medicine at Columbia University College of Physicians and Surgeons. Upon graduating College of the Holy Cross in 1960, Jack attended State University of New York, Upstate Medical Center, and went on to postgraduate training at Boston City Hospital and two years of training at the University of California. He also studied or practiced at the Mayo Clinic and

the Tufts New England Medical Center. At the Baystate Medical Center he was named Chief of Nephrology, at the Lehigh Valley Hospital he was Chair of the Department of Medicine and at Penn State University he was a professor of medicine. In 2008, he received a Mastership in the American College of Physicians (M.A.C.P.). He received the Daley Founders Award from the Alliance of Academic Internal Medicine in 2014 in recognition of his national accomplishments in medical education

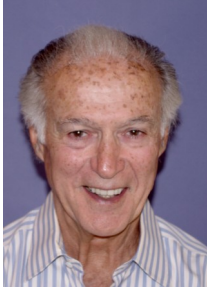
SOCIAL EVENTS

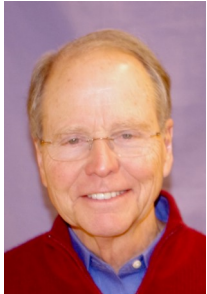
MEMBERSHIP
